Hopefully this summer some rather major repairs and restorations will start taking place in the altar area and elsewhere throughout our church facilities. Please "pardon our dust" especially as the plaster is being sanded and repaired. This is being funded by the generosity of so many of you that are participating in our Campaign project to "Renew, Refresh, and Restore" some physical aspects of Trinity.

Last year on my sabbatical, one of the courses I had at Oxford University was entitled "Living Buildings: Architecture and Religious Experience". We are truly blest with a building where holiness can be sensed and an encounter with the sacred can be heightened. Beautiful symbols and patterns in glass, wood, and paint hopefully can help draw us closer to the divine, or add a different dimension to our religious experience. But as with any building, the years can bring wear and tear. We are both repairing the old, and bringing in some new with additional windows.

Another exciting aspect of renewal and refreshment here at Trinity is the possibility of expanding our ministry and outreach to smaller children and their families. We hope to find a person willing to take on a part time position (calling?) as a Director of Family Ministry. Jesus said "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (Mt. 19:14). The emphasis of this ministry would be for newborns and children through elementary grades (and of course their parents as well). This could help grow both small group ministry (such as Mom to Mom groups, in home Bible studies, etc.) and larger functions such as outings, other social/spiritual activities.

If you know of anyone who might be interested in this position, please contact either myself or Pr. Jake, or the office for more details such as a job description and more in depth conversation.

May you have a wonderful summer and safe travels if you are going out of town. Please keep Trinity in your prayers as we minister and disciple in the present, but also prepare and plan for the future.



Pastor Jake Made it to Berlin!!!

It seems a shame he still had to buy a plane ticket, because Pr. Jake has completed his run from Kalamazoo to Berlin! He finished the 1450 mile trek on Tuesday June 11, almost a full month ahead of schedule and in total he ran for 7 days, 14 hours, 53 minutes, and 7 seconds at an average pace of 7:34 a mile to cover 1451.6 miles! Not bad for 11 months work!

And thanks to all who donated and pledged your support, we raised \$1.35 per mile which is \$2,642 for the youth of Trinity! If you have not yet paid your pledge you may do so at your convenience with a check to Trinity Lutheran Church marked "Run to Germany" on the memo line. Pantry Patter

Our recent experience with the mail-carriers' drive has saddened us and resulted in a favor we have to ask of you.

About one quarter to one third of the food we received was outdated (beyond the expiration date). Some items were from as far back as 2007! We are "sad" because we have to discard the food that is so outdated. (We operate our pantry on the philosophy that if this is something we would not want to eat ourselves, we should not be providing it to "Kalamazoo's Hungry" either). Apparently, many people who donate to the mail-carriers' drive clean out their pantries without attention to the age of the foods they donate. This is not a criticism; it is just an observation.

Our "favor" is that when donating to our pantry or food collection drives, please check the dates on the items you give to assure they are no more than a year old for canned goods and 3 months for other packaged goods (crackers, baking supplies, pasta, and cookies for example).

The items we need currently for distribution from the pantry are:

- Various beans of all kinds in packages or cans;
- cans of pork & beans;
- canned meat of all kinds (e.g. chicken, tuna, spam);
- mustard & catsup;
- peanut butter and
- FRESH PRODUCE. As your home ("victory" for those old enough to remember) gardens start to ripen.....we will take all the fresh produce you can give us. Loaves & Fishes has been unable to provide any produce for the last month or so.

As always we are grateful for and humbled by your generosity!

Synod Assembly

I had the pleasure of attending the Synod Assembly in Lansing from May 19 to May 21 2013. The theme this year was "Always Being Made New". It was a busy few days with worship, speakers and the election of a new Bishop.

To condense the assembly into just a few words: hot, delays and great joy. The election started on Sunday evening with the first ballot which is open to all clergy. The results were posted after 11 that evening and a lot of the voting members stayed up to see the results. The Rev. Dr. Sherman Hicks from national was there to direct the voting.

Monday morning we opened with Devotion lead by Lansing Catholic Bishop, who has developed a good working relationship with our Bishop on several projects. Following this, there were several reports and a second ballot. The second ballot was over-voted so it was declared void by Rev. Hicks. More votes were cast than members registered. The second ballot was repeated and the third ballot was also held, each time reducing the number of candidates. Between ballots we heard more reports and also heard the candidates for bishop answer questions. On Monday evening we did have a banquet and honored our departing Bishop Schleicher for his 6 years of service.

On Tuesday morning we started with Devotions lead by the Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia. A very interesting leader who I did hear talk at a workshop I attended on Monday. After Devotions, we had a question and answer session with the remaining 3 candidates for Bishop followed by a vote. More reports were presented and then a final vote for Bishop. After the vote, the budget for the synod was presented and voted on. With each of these last several votes were also candidates for committees and synod council being voted on. It was not just simple ballots but as many as 25 or more people running for 14 different position. At the end of the voting, the Bishop Elect was announced: Rev. Dr. Craig Satterlee, a Professor of Homiletics at LSTC and a graduate of The University of Michigan and Trinity Seminary in Columbus.

The assembly closed with a joyful worship service. Please note that next years assembly will be a Joint assembly with Southeast Michigan Synod and held in Dearborn.

An update from Amy (Wohlfert) Rice via Holly....

I am sending you my address....letters every now and then are GREAT for morale!! I am traveling with one of the general surgeons I'll be working with. So far SHE is pretty cool...I think it will be great working with her, and she said "by the time I'm done with you you'll be ready to be a surgeon"....She's already said she's going to get me into the OR and we were reviewing medical stuff tonight!

(On arrival in Afghanistan)

Lauren (friend of Amy) and I ended up going out to a VSP (Village Stability Platform) with one of the ODAs (Operational Detachment Alpha), which is what we call the SF (Special Forces) teams. We were doing an FTT (Female Treatment Team) mission. The officer who usually does them was sick and she could not go on this one, they were going to cancel it, but when the team sergeant heard there were two SOCMs (Special Operations Combat Medics) and that it was Lauren and I, he said "this HAS to happen"!! He was our interim 1SG when we were in school, and the senior medic for the team was our instructor during part of the course too!! It was AWESOME!!! We had the BEST time out there, and their whole team was soooo great!

The mission was actually really cool too, and I guess that we did a really good job because they told us the influence is much farther reaching than just the two days of classes we did! There was even a news article written about it, which they are going to send to us and I'll work on getting it to you too! The women were soo fun! There were three trained midwives and two nurses in the classes, plus two local midwives. We had about 50 females between the two days of classes...which I think is the largest turnout they have had at one of these missions!! I'm super proud of us, and it's nice to know that our time here is actually having an impact!

We did convoys on three of the five days we were there, which all went great. I'm glad that I FINALLY got to be "outside the wire" and feel like I was REALLY participating.... The guys on the team were awesome, and apparently Lauren and I made a really good impression because we were invited back anytime we want!! THAT is why I joined SOF (Special Operation Forces) and wanted to do this job, to be out there with the guys, supporting their mission, boosting morale, making an impact here, and feeling like a part of something bigger!!!!!!! I would go to the bathroom in a WAG bag for my whole deployment if I got to work with a team like that the entire time!! (a WAG bag is literally a bag that you pee/poop in and then it gets burned...the kit comes with an inner and outer bag, a small amount of TP and a wet wipe...they had toilets, but they were not connected to anything, just mounted on the floor, so you put the bag in the commode and then pulled it out when you were done) It was soooooooo worth it!!! Not to mention we got to fire lots of big guns...that always makes everything better!!

When you fly over Afghanistan, the countryside looks a lot like Egypt oddly enough...just more green in places, and snow on the mountaintops. It really is a beautiful country, minus the war.

All Who Hunger, Gather Gladly Session 2: Do We Have Enough?

We all know the story: A crowd of people follows Jesus out to the countryside, and by the time evening rolls around they're hungry. The disciples tell Jesus to send the people away so they can go get supper in town, and he answers, "You give them something to eat." Is Jesus talking to us?

Christ, Be Our Light – hymn 715. "Longing for food, many are hungry. Longing for water, many still thirst. Make us your bread, broken for others, shared until all are fed. Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts."

One of my favorite Bible passages, and the one our son, Jim, chose for his Confirmation verse is Micah 6:8: *And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.* As a matter of fact, I was reading this passage this morning during my devotion time. It speaks to me every time I read it. I think it relates to our topic this month in that we are all "called to be food and drink for one another" – the Spirit of God is present in each of us, making us God's dwelling place and home. And as God's home, we bear Christ to the world around us. In the events of each day, we are <u>called</u> to be **light** & **life**, **food** & **shelter**, **justice seekers**, **pain bearers**, **life givers**, **peacemakers** – just as Christ is all these things for us. In a world where hunger comes in <u>many</u> forms, this is salvation. This is God's kingdom, the body of Christ, here and now.

O God, make us a church of living stones. Make us your bread. Make us your living voice. Rescue us from self-absorption. Drive out the fears that seem to haunt us all. Help us embrace a new way of being and of seeing. Show us how to be food and drink for one another. Sustain us so that we might serve. Amen.
