Tillers International has succeeded in making arrangements of our fellow member, Dave Kramer, to join a work group in Mozambique. Trinity will be helping support this project, and anyone interested in making a donation to further help fund the project can make checks out to Trinity with

"Tillers-Dave Kramer" in the memo line.

Here are the details from Dave:

"A coworker at Tillers, Jeffery Hillman, will be traveling with me. He is our measuring and evaluation coordinator and will be setting up a process with the local staff to evaluate the overall impact of the project. The local Tillers staff in Mozambique have selected two groups of 30 farmers who either have oxen or can hire someone with oxen, to get training in conservation agriculture. Conservation agriculture involves using minimum tillage (a ripping plow rather than a moldboard plow) to reduce soil erosion. We have already introduced ripping plows. We would like to focus on mechanical planters and weeders on this trip. Mechanical ox drawn planters allow faster and earlier planting after the first rains. The rainy seasons in Mozambique are becoming shorter and shorter with global warming. Planting quickly and early is important. Ox drawn weeders reduce the burden of hand weeding. Most minimum tillage farming is done with the use of herbicides, but Tillers is trying to steer clear of introducing herbicides for several reasons. Herbicides are expensive for small farmers, and on small farms we have often seen herbicides being applied manually without proper safety equipment. So the need for a good ox drawn weeding tool is important.

I will be working for three weeks with some metalworking craftsmen on training for how to construct planters and weeders. The project will continue after I leave, with the local staff continuing to make planters and weeders and introducing them to the groups of selected farmers. An Amish community and some other donors to Tillers are paying the cost to keep the training going for one year after we leave.

We are hoping to work on several planters and weeders while I am there. Honestly, I do not know exactly what the current cost for materials for a planter or weeder will be. Sometimes we have to modify the plans because certain sizes or types of materials are not available. I am guessing the cost for one planter will be around \$175, and the cost for a weeder around \$100. If there are any additional funds at Trinity to help with some project materials that would be great."

Highlights from the Church Council Meeting on November 14, 2021



Treasurer: The remaining funds from the forgiven PPP loan have been moved to Restricted Educated Funds and will be allocated for future needs.

<u>Financial Secretary</u>: A revised 2022 budget was approved to be brought to the congregation.

<u>Pastor Ken</u>: Future funding for the Family Ministry was discussed. Nate Mattson has accepted the position of Director of Music beginning January 1st. In order to re-open the nursery attendants are needed.

Pastor Jake: Emma McCleary has begun her new position as Director of Youth Ministry

<u>President</u>: Recent events: The newly renovated space was dedicated Sunday, November 7th. Rodney Freudenberg and Judy Sherrod were recognized for their tireless efforts in making this extensive upgrade a reality. (We sincerely thank all who contributed/volunteered for this huge project!) A recognition of Trinity's sainted members was held in the courtyard on All Saints' Sunday; it included a bagpipe anthem by Pastor Jake.

Christian Education: Preparations are underway for a virtual children's Christmas program.
