REPORT OF THE TRINITY EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH FOUNDATION

I am happy to provide this report on behalf of the Directors of the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church Foundation. Members of the Board, in addition to me are: Pastor Johnson, Pastor Lehman, Ben Bakalyar, Michael Mueller, Julie Bosley and Keith Peterson

Despite a difficult financial market in 2022, the Foundation finished the year with assets in excess of \$1,400,000. While we were certainly impacted by the general downward trend in the markets, our generally conservative investment approach resulted in performance much better than the major stock market averages.

Following are the highlights of the Foundation during 2022:

The following contributions were made:

- \$30,000 to the General Fund of the Church
- \$10,000 to the Sabbatical Fund
- We received contributions of \$30,000 to the Foundation

As always I can not help reflecting on the impact the Foundation has had on Trinity and its programs over the past twenty-eight years. As I reviewed my file, I note the following:

Contributions of over \$1,100,000 have been made to Trinity Lutheran Church. Included in these contributions are:

• Over \$650,000 to the Annual General and Building funds, for support and expansion of ongoing ministries at Trinity.

Significant support for Special Projects, Including:

- Brick repair and replacement
- Purchase and Installation of the original elevator
- Construction of the Handicap Restroom
- Renovation of the Kitchen
- Repair and Expansion of the Organ
- Replacement of the Boiler
- Renovation of Fellowship Hall
- Purchase and removal of Cedar Street House

- Roof and Window Repair and Replacement (several times)
- Re-surfacing of the Parking Lot (twice)
- Repairs to Rental Property prior to Donation
- Repair of the Stained Glass Window in the Organ Loft
- Funding Support for Sabbaticals (Ongoing)
- Support of several Capital Campaigns including Enter, Elevate and Gather
- Scholarship support through "Lutheran Graduate Study" fund
- Support of the Summer Concert Series
- Renovations in the Parsonage

The gift we received from Elva Lovell over twenty-eight years ago, along with the many additional contributions we have received, (over \$300,000) has had a significant and positive impact on our congregation and the expansion of our ministry. In many cases, the projects noted above could not have been undertaken without the support provided by the Foundation. I believe we have indeed been Good Stewards of these gifts.

One for my responsibilities as a Director of the Foundation is to seek additional contributions to the Foundation. I would therefore be remiss if I didn't ask: "Have you considered a gift to support the future of Trinity Lutheran Church through your Foundation?" Please consider this possibility and especially consider providing for Trinity in your Estate Planning as Elva Lovell so unselfishly did.

There are many ways you can include Trinity in your current and future financial and estate planning. Providing for the Trinity Foundation directly in you Will is the most common method. There are however many other ways, including: Charitable Gift Annuities, Deferred Payment Charitable Gift Annuities and Charitable Remainder Trusts, to name just a few. Family Ministry 2022 Annual Report

This past year we have witnessed the world shift from being masked and separate to being more in-person and unmasked. While we are still dealing with the Covid-19 disease, because of vaccinations we are able to be together more and more.

In January, Family Ministry joined with the Youth Group and other church members and tied almost 30 blankets together for Project Linus. These blankets will be given to children in need. A Thrivent Action Grant helped purchase the blanket supplies. February we did what Michiganders do in February and went sledding! Our group was fueled by hot chocolate and sweet cookies. It was *snow* much fun! In March we had a Lenten Pretzels and Prayer Day. After lunch, we made pretzels, Lenten prayer candles, prayer booklets, and special pretzel snacks to share with friends.

During April, we offered a Family Movie Night, with a special Easter egg hunt included. Then later in the month, the Youth Group offered a Parent's Evening Out. The youth led the kids in games and activities, while parents had much needed time off! In May, Family Ministry met at the Kalamazoo Nature Center for a picnic lunch, exploring the Visitor's Center, and then walking over to the Nature Playground. June was a busy month. We had a great group of 18 kids go to Stony Lake Lutheran Camp during Week One. Since camp has closed the past two summers, they made camp a free option for kids this summer. We had first timers, elementary, confirmation, and high school youth attend. Everyone had a wonderful time! At the end of the month, Family Ministry hosted a church-wide picnic potluck and kickball game. The weather was perfect, the food was delicious, and the game was super fun! We took the month of July off to prep from Family Vacation Bible School and for many of our church families to go to Germany!

In August, Family Ministry and Christian Education worked together to create a Marketplace Family Vacation Bible School. Because I had gotten Covid after the Germany trip, our three weeks of VBS was down to two weeks, but in the end it worked out better. We had so many wonderful volunteers and

participants for VBS this year! It was so wonderful to see everyone work together and create such a memorable and meaningful experience. After our family dinner and Bible story time, the families divided into two groups and rotated from Synagogue school to Games. Then afterwards, we all gathered together in the Marketplace, which was filled with carpentry, candle making, pottery, basket weaving, grape stomping, jewelry making, a bakery, and a spice and herb shop. Thank you, again, to all of our volunteers and family participants!!!

September saw the beginning of the Sunday school year with an Ice Cream Social. It was a busy month at church, so our Family Ministry events began in October. Since most everything is in-person and mask-less, we decided to bring back two Family Ministry staples—our Parent Small Group and Infant/Toddler Small Group. Those groups have been meeting on Sunday mornings. It is wonderful to get back and meet together again. In October, we had an event that talked about how Awesome our God is, complete with a couple of science experiments to prove it! November was a challenging month for me. I had a planned hysterectomy. While I recovered, our Family Ministry friends made cards for our Caring Ministry. Those were mailed out at the beginning of December. After a couple of small group meetings and a wonderful Sunday school Christmas program (in-person!!), that completed the year for Family Ministry.

Many thanks to Thrivent members who wrote special Thrivent Action Team grants that helped provide funds for our Vacation Bible School, Project Linus blankets, and other service projects.

A big heartfelt thank you to the many Trinity members who support this ministry with their behind-the-scenes assistance, including but not limited to: Pastor Ken, Pastor Jake, Katie Grubaugh, Margaret Stevenson, Jim & Joyce Magerlein, Emma McCleary, Christian Ed Team, Youth Group members, VBS church member volunteers, and the Family Ministry parents.

Annual Report of the Organist/Director of Music

I am happy to serve God as Organist & Music Director at Trinity. When I started at Trinity on January 2 of 2022, the choir hadn't sung for two years due to the COVID-19 pandemic. After much discussion and emails back and forth (Do we mask? Do we stand and sing at a distance?), we resumed regular rehearsals in March. The former routine (Thursday evening rehearsals, Sunday morning warm-up, and singing for the later Sunday morning service) didn't seem to work well in the post-pandemic era so we made a change when we resumed in the fall. We changed our schedule and now have our weekly choir rehearsal on Sunday mornings instead of Thursday evenings. This change has been received well and I am very pleased with the results. We currently have seventeen regular members of the choir. Ten of the seventeen are new; they were not part of the choir prior to the pandemic. Two choir members came to us as music students from Western Michigan University, one of which I recruited this past fall. I am very grateful for each and every choir member, their musicianship, commitment, and – most of all – their love of God, which shows with every note they sing.

In addition to my playing the organ for our worship and the choir singing regularly for the Sunday morning services, here are some of the highlights of the past year: I played the organ and Don Anderson sang and led the liturgy for our Wednesday evening midweek Lenten services. In March, we started the choir after a two-year hiatus. In April the choir presented the Good Friday Choral Tenebrae service. We were pleased to have Jesse Lemons enhancing our worship with his trumpet at all three Easter Sunday services. The choir went above and beyond by singing for two of these Easter Sunday morning services. On June 5, we had Jesse Lemons and his trumpet back for our Pentecost Sunday worship and this was the last Sunday of the choir season. In the summer months, we went to one service and the choir sang on two of these summer Sundays. On August 14, we were grateful that Bruce Uchimura brought cello music to our worship. Later in August, Don Anderson and I attended a music reading session in Grand Rapids sponsored by GIA Publications. This gave us an opportunity to read some of the new music published by GIA. We resumed choir on September 11, the Sunday after Labor Day, rehearsing on Sunday mornings. In October we collaborated on separate occasions with choirs from two other Lutheran Churches. The choir of Immanuel

joined with us to sing for Pastor Dale Krueger's funeral service and the choir of St. Peter in Battle Creek joined us to sing for Pastor Ed Ruble's ordination service. In November, we had the West Michigan BrassWorks join us for All Saints Sunday and the choir sang for the Thanksgiving Eve' service. On November 14, the Berghaus Organ Company of Chicago was at Trinity to tune and service the organ. In December, the West Michigan BrassWorks joined us again and our choir did a great job presenting music for the Advent Lessons & Carols Service. The choir rounded out the calendar year by singing for the 7:00 p.m. service on Christmas Eve'. During the year, we were blessed to have had Ashley Wineland, flute, and Ben Bakalyar, cello, accompany the choir on their instruments and Debbie Harding played the prelude and communion music at the early service on Christmas Eve'. In appreciation of a successful calendar year for the choir, it was a privilege for my wife Deb and me to host a Choir Christmas party on December 30 at our home in Comstock Township.

I am grateful to Pastors Ken & Jake for their leadership, grateful to my predecessor Bill Musselman for his friendship and for filling in for me monthly, grateful to our choir and instrumentalists for strengthening our worship with beautiful music, grateful to all the good people of Trinity for their support and faithfulness, and grateful to God for giving us something to sing about in Jesus Christ our Lord.

During the month of August, many of our youth helped with the Family Vacation Bible School. They assisted our elementary kids with the shops, setting up, cleaning up, and they helped with the skits.

September saw the beginning of the Sunday school year. This year, we're trying Confirmation class and a separate High School class on Sunday mornings. It seems to be working well so far. The Youth group also held a planning meeting to get some ideas about what activities they would like to do this year. It's a big list, but we'll try to get some fun stuff in!

In October, we held our first meeting. It was a combined middle school and high school group. This school year, we're talking about our Spiritual Gifts. After a few silly games, we took a test to see what our gifts are and then talked about a few ways we can use them in our lives. Later in

Annual Report of Christian Education at Trinity

2022 was a rebuilding year for Christian Education and after the tumult of the Covid pandemic, Trinity has returned to a more regular education program schedule.

Children's Sunday School has been meeting in-person each week. Our Rally Sunday Ice Cream Social was a fun kick-off this fall, and we have nearly 40 children enrolled. A sincere thank you to all our many faithful teachers and classroom helpers. Emily Wright is teaching the preschool/kindergarten class, and Ashley Wineland teaches the elementary schoolers. Jason Grubaugh is leading the Youth group while Pr. Jake Lehman holds Confirmation Class for the middle schoolers during the Education hour. Heidi Albertson has resumed the popular Parent Small group and Baby Group in the Family Ministry room on alternating Sundays.

Adults have several opportunities each week to learn and grow in their faith. Pr. Ken leads a bible study in the lounge on Sundays. There is also a separate Men's Bible study meeting. "Scripture & Sandwiches" started as a Zoom study during the pandemic and continues to meet virtually each week.

Many of our children went to the Living Waters Ministry Camp at Stony Lake in June. The camp had not been open since 2019, but continued giving during the pandemic generously allowed campers to attend this past summer at no cost. Men from our congregation participated in a retreat at Camp Arcadia. The Youth met with other groups from around the state at the Charge gathering in Traverse City in November.

The Church Library held a grand-reopening in the fall in their new space on the third floor. The librarians have also been populating our new gathering space with seasonal books for children and adults which has encouraged the congregation to utilize this special resource at Trinity. Thank you to Maryann Hubble and Mary Bittner for all their hard work with this big project.

Heidi Albertson has continued to find creative ways to manage Family Ministry, including fellowship events each month, plus a very successful VBS again in August. This year we held a Marketplace at the church.

Families learned in a simulated "synagogue" and shopped in a 1st century "bazaar." Everyone had fun learning more about daily life in Jesus' time and imagining how His miracles might have happened. Thank you to all the many volunteers who prepared food and shared crafts, songs, and skits.

Facilities Report – For Year 2022

- One of the unfortunate things which occurred this last year was the fact that our church garage was broken into on two occasions during 2022. The garage was accessed a different way from the first occurrence to the second occurrence. Reports were filed with Kalamazoo Public Safety both times. Besides security provisions subsequently done with the church garage additional security provisions are underway for the entire outside perimeter to the church building & parking lot. Special thanks to Rodney Freudenburg, Steve Bittner, Dave Grubaugh & Shaun Wright with helping to enhance security provisions with the church garage. We are very grateful to members Ardis Lielzuika and Don Irving for either consigning snow removal equipment to the church or otherwise donating snow removal equipment. A youth from within the church was hired for sidewalk & steps snow removal for winter season 2021/2022.
- One very significant activity accomplished during the summer of 2022 was exterior brick restoration for the north side of the sanctuary building. That was the portion of the building in most urgent need of attention. We also got updated proposals for brick restoration & capstone repair for the rest of the sanctuary building. We are very happy to report that the remaining east, south & west facings to the sanctuary are being paid for by an anonymous person within the congregation. That remaining work will be done as soon as weather permits in 2023. The concern we have contracted with is Building Restoration, Inc.
- We want to thank Steve Bittner, once again, for the fine work completed up on the top floor to the education building. It was work connected to the relocated church library. Includes construction of a new wall & mounting of several new shelving pieces. Steve also built a new coat hanging system on the main floor in the hallway between the two pastor's respective offices. Thanks for your never-ending assistance Steve!

- Very special thanks to Shelly Meyer (plus husband Darin and two sons) who has been a key person in recent years regarding maintenance & plantings in the church courtyard, church entrance areas and the BIG planters in the parking lot. Thank you, Shelly, for your continued & talented contribution. We also continue to get significant contributions in the courtyard area and other landscaping efforts from Judy Morison plus her daughter Naomi. Thank you ladies! Collectively, we are committed to work tirelessly to make the courtyard and columbarium area as beautiful as possible. Finally, we've repetitively gotten assistance from Max Wineland (and sons) with mulch material for the church. He has picked up, delivered and help distribute. Thank you Max!
- Special thanks, once again, to Portage Great Scapes (John Pawlak & son Aaron) for assisting with moving the big planters in the parking lot each spring and fall.
- During late summer of 2022 a "split" air conditioning system was installed for the church office. Work was done by Shaun Wright and Home Energy Solutions https: (www.heskzoo.com). Plans are in place for similar air conditioning systems for each of the pastor's offices during 2023.

2022 SERVICE MINISTRY ANNUAL REPORT

Guided by God's call to love and serve our neighbors, the Service Ministry team shall lead the congregation in meeting the physical and spiritual needs of people of all ages and socioeconomic status in our local community and globally.

- <u>Salvation Army Angel Tree</u>--We donated 27 gifts and 33 gift cards to children so they could have a brighter Christmas.
- <u>Christs Clothes Closet</u>--We serve, on average, 20-30 families every week. The
 demand is great ,we are one of very few placed where people do not have to
 register or prove need. During our coat give away we served 27 families with
 68 people.
- Fair Trade Sales 2022 Fair Trade was available at coffee hour after both services the first and third Sunday for all of 2022. Although sales did improve over the last two years when worship attendance was limited due to COVID and attendance at coffee hour was disrupted, total sales for the year was \$1335.50. There were five months when sales were below \$100. It is my opinion that this is not a ministry that is in high demand for various reasons. Fair Trade coffee is available now in sever stores in the area including People's Food Coop and Sawall's. We continue to support Fair Trade by ordering coffee and tea for Trinity's social hour and events. My suggestions is that we discontinue selling products during regular services I am willing to sell products that are still on the shelf until they are gone and continue to order for Trinity's use. I have enjoyed being part of this ministry— Nancy Diment.
- Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes Thanks to a grant from Thrivent and our generous congregation, we were able to send off 60 shoeboxes this year to show God's love in Eswatini (formerly Swaziland), Trinidad and Tobago, Namibia and Mozambique. Children in these locations will have a chance to learn about Jesus. — Linda Ward
- Bingo at Ministry with Community Every second Tuesday I take a load of prizes to Ministry w/C where we show God's love from Trinity through Bingo prizes. Unfortunately we are limited to 13 attendees due to chances of exposure to disease. The prizes are almost all \$1 but mean the world to the players. They have something to do for an hour and it takes their minds off

their difficult circumstances. Everyone gets at least one prize. I have had difficulty finding help and would appreciate volunteers available to step in if needed. This is once a month and takes a total of two hours. Please contact Linda Ward if you are interested.

- <u>SCRIP Program</u> (*gift cards*) Our gift card fundraiser through RaiseRight perked up in 2022 with a number of Trinity members signing up for personal accounts under Trinity's membership. We continued to purchase prizes for BINGO games at Ministry with Community. Our highlight came in December, however, when over \$700 in gift cards was donated to the Salvation Army Angel Tree. We doubt you will find a fundraising project that gives you more bang for your buck; thanks for your support!
- S.W.E.L.L. (Area Lutheran churches* supporting Samaritas foster care)
- The S.W.E.L.L. Partnership's main annual event is furnishing a taco bar for the Christmas party to which all foster care families are invited each December. Throughout the year, however, our churches provide Welcome Baskets for those entering the Independent Living Plus program. (These young people have aged out of foster care but still need assistance living independently.) Recently a bedding drive has also been initiated so new ILP+ arrivals have their own sheets, etc., and can take them with them when they move on to other situations. Christmas gifts are provided for ILP+ ages; all ages receive gift cards for their birthdays. Special requests that have been approved include: vacuums for both the guys' and girls' homes, a Hoverboard, and bunk beds. These items are purchased with funds from the area churches, monetary gifts, and Action Team grants from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. Thanks for helping us help these kids! (*Participating churches are Lord of Life, Lutheran Church of the Savior, Prince of Peace, and Trinity Lutheran.)
- Backpacks for Foster Kids In late July every year Trinity's Service Ministry Team donates enough backpacks for all school-age children in the care of Samaritas (105 this year). Trinity members and friends generously donate backpacks, school supplies, soap bars and washcloths, and toothbrushes and toothpaste; others are purchased with Action Team grants from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. Volunteers fill the backpacks and deliver them to Samaritas so that caseworkers can give them to the kids before the start of school. This is a much-appreciated project!
- <u>Book Cart at MWC</u> After being put on hold off and on during Covid, the book cart at Ministry with Community has continued weekly this year. Since

returning from Covid, the number of members served has decreased mostly due to changes in the population and capacity limits for inside the building. The average number of books checked out has dropped to about 7 per week.

- Prison Ministry The prison ministry has grown significantly this year. What started with communication with three Kalamazoo women serving sentences in the women's prison in Ypsilanti, has grown to communication and advocacy for up to three dozen incarcerated individuals. Some have since been released. Communication includes electronic messaging through JPay averaging about 40 messages sent and received per month, letters and cards, phone calls received and this fall starting to go in to the women's prison for the first time to visit a Kalamazoo woman sentenced to life.
- Three Thrivent grants submitted by Trinity members this year have helped within the prison ministry. One secured 25 \$10 McDonald's gift cards which are sent in birthday cards to children who have incarcerated moms as a small way to help maintain the bond. Another was used to buy additional food and hygiene items for five women. A final was able to buy requested books and magazines for 13 people, including four from Kalamazoo. Jennifer Gougeon-Catarino
- <u>Care Kits</u> Instead of sending personal care kits to LWR this year, donations
 were made to Ministry for Community to support our needy population here
 in Kalamazoo. Congregants donated several bags full of items such as
 personal size soaps, lotions, and shampoos. Thanks to all who contributed.
- Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry Following the Covid closing and then the
 construction project, Trinity's food pantry finally reopened in March of this
 year. Reorganizing our new space and determining service times took a
 while.

Changes at Loaves and Fishes now include an option of home delivery of food as well as pick up at local sites. Following L&F guidelines, we assemble orders and meet clients at our new entrance for loading food into cars.

These changes, as well as our closing, resulted in a very slow start to our reopening. Our times of operation are now Tuesdays from 11-1, coinciding with the time that our clothes closet is open. That, in addition to an increased awareness of our reopening, has brought us many new clients.

However, our numbers are often low and inconsistent. We are hopeful that we will see an increase in demand in the new year since we are told that there is still great need for food assistance in our area. We are grateful to have many willing volunteers who have offered to help.

Quilters - Despite the covid shut-downs from time to time, the quilters were
able to complete and ship 104 quilts to Lutheran World Relief. It has been a
challenging year, both in terms of meeting times, but also because the cost of
our supplies such as twin flat sheets and batting have soared. We continue to
appreciate all donations of cotton and cotton-like fabrics in pieces that
measure a minimum of 11x11 inches.

Let us continue to be a blessing to others. Thank you all for sharing your time and talent!
